



A 10 days course on **Continental Cuisine** for 08 candidates of **Northern Marine** was held from 08th March 2021 to 18th March 2021.



Security

General upkeep of the campus i.e garden, garbage clearing, and wild growth removing being done with available manpower.

Athletic ground Fire:- The dry grass and tree branches/leaves dumped in athletic ground caught Fire multiple time during the months, we had to take help from O.N.G.C's Fire Wing's help for putting off the fire as the dry material was burning fast and

We have cleared all the debris from the collapsed car parking area near the hospital.

We are deputing Security personals to Worli as Security guards at Worli are on leave or resigned. We have cut and removed all uprooted trees and couple of the leaning trees and also cleaned up the fence stretch from heights to Samander Mahal to make way for the maintenance staff to repair the fence.

Garbage burning is being done on daily basis at the existing incinerator, and discontinued burning at the ground, but heavy branches and coconut/palm leaves cannot be burned there as the incinerator is small.

Along with the entire available gardeners we have removed dry grass and other tiny bushes which came up on the athletic ground during the monsoon so that available labour can clean the rubbish laying in the ground.
