UK GMDSS Audit was carried out by Mr. Keith Mitchell on 18th September 2019.

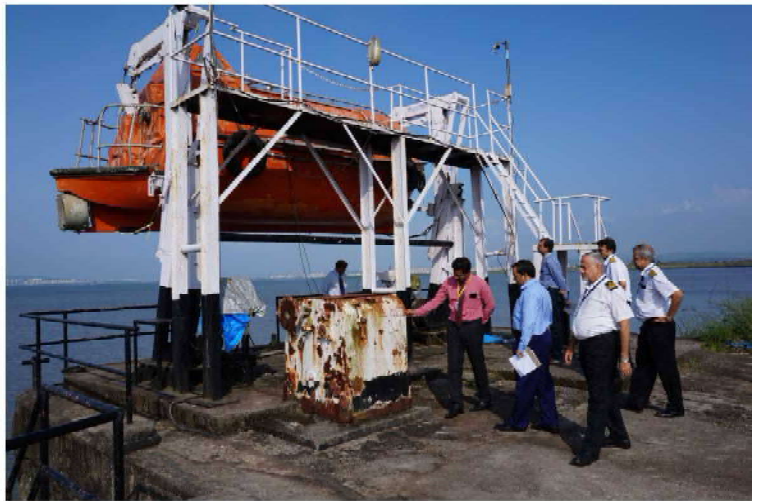

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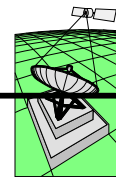

THE GREAT ESCAPE

FOR a city that got its name from the Portuguese Bom Bahia of the good bay, the story of its evolution is inseparable from that of how the sea has watched over it, allowing itself to be reclaimed, and its waters providing a natural harbour for countless vessels.

On World Maritime Day today, we bring you a slice of Mumbai's seafaring history through the Marine Museum tucked away inside the quaint, verdant campus of Training Ship Rahaman in Nhava near Ulwe in Navi Mumbai, a nautical training institute owned by the Yusuf family. Based in Worli, they have strengthened their association with India's seafaring community in various capacities; first by starting the Bombay Steam Navigation Company (BSNC) in 1865, and then, through the maritime training facility that Sir Mohamed Yusuf founded in 1910.

The 107-year-old museum is

India's oldest maritime museum, and I am here to meet its curator Pruthvi Rangnekar. "It was Sadashiv Gorakshakar, the then director of the erstwhile Prince of Wales Museum, who was instrumental in developing the museum," Rangnekar informs. We start with the Heritage Gallery, which depicts Indian shipping through the ages with replicas of Harappan seals featuring maritime motifs, reproductions of manuscripts from the Mughal period with mentions of sea trade, etc. A section is dedicated to models of important ships built in Bombay's dockyards.

The thoughtful display extends to the first floor where the history of Nhava and its acquisition by the ONGC is intertwined with BSNC's history, while the second floor showcases the family's prized possessions. The walkthrough ends in a marine ecology section.

Haroun Yusuf, chairman, Sir Mohamed Yusuf Seamen Welfare Foundation, shares, "We plan to make a visit to the campus a day-long experience in the future, with a walk through the surrounding mangroves as well as the museum." A fitting day out for residents of a city nurtured by the sea.

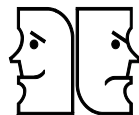

PRE-SEA CONTRIBUTION VISIT TO THE DOCKS

It was a bright, early Wednesday morning, on 11th October 2019 when we mustered in front of the George Campbell library in white uniform and safety helmets, excited about our visit to the docks. I personally didn't sleep very well the previous night with the excitement gushing inside me. During the muster, Capt P. Joag enlightened us about the do's and don'ts at the port and we assured him of good discipline and behaviour. We boarded the campus bus and after an hour and a half journey, we finally arrived at the Yellow Gate of the Indira Docks. After a strict security check, we were permitted to enter the premises.

With Capt. Joag's continuous explanation of things which we have only learnt in theory, I was assured to leave the port with all my doubts and queries answered. We saw ships, tugs, submarines and warships. It was an amazing experience to watch this huge and beautiful bulk carrier Chipolbrokmoon- IMO 9272 216 built in Hong Kong, loading cargo with huge cranes. Fortunately we got a chance to interact with the Chief Officer. We saw a huge black submarine passing through the shining water which was a fortunate sight for us. All these things made a great impression on us as facts were noted down in our pocket diary. As I made note, I wondered how these ships like Chipolbrokmoon berth so perfectly in such a confined space along the jetty. Then Capt. Joag explained how tugs assist a ship in its berthing procedure. These powerful little boats can pull and push vessels without damaging or denting their hull. Tugs, Gulmohar Star-IMO 9819 961 and Lakshmi IMO- 9154 945 assisted these in bound and out bound vessels.

Then we moved to the store house where goods were carefully shifted with the help of forklifts before they were loaded on board. After that we visited the dry dock and learnt about its purpose. It is here that huge ships are repaired from the keel to the hull. We could clearly see the loadline on the side of a ship brought in for repair. I was astonished to learn how a single gate can hold out so much water in order to carry out repair work.

As we went further we saw a passenger ship M. V. Angriya- IMO 9150353 that operates from Mumbai to Goa and has a capacity of over 2000 passengers. It was truly a luxury liner and a fun fact was that she was built at Mazagon docks. Despite its classy look and design, I found the neighbouring warships as fascinating as the cruise liner. These mighty chariots of the Almighty fight the fierce waves as powerfully as any other vessel and are the pride of our nation. Some of these warships were right in front of us- INS Kochi, INS-Trikand and INS- Viraat R 22 were loaded with missiles and machine guns. Their powerful RADAR could detect vessels up to 500 nautical miles away.

It was time to depart from the docks. We returned to the security area and after a thorough check we boarded the bus and left the Indira Docks. This experience had a great impact on me. Realizing my responsibility on these huge machines made me kind of nervous by just how challenging a sailor's job is! And I accept the challenge because not everyone can become a sailor. I am truly grateful to the institute for this wonderful experience.
